We work at the regional and national levels, assisting in reviewing policies, strategies and programmes. We also assist communities in implementing climate change adaptation and mitigation approaches in the agriculture, forestry and fisheries, sectors.

Under the EU GIZ ACSE programme, each of the four Melanesian countries Fiji, PNG, Solomon Islands and Vanuatu have been awarded 1 million Euros for projects on climate change adaptation and sustainable energy. In the moment, the project design documents are assessed.

Ladies and gentlemen, please allow me also to commend our gracious host, the Honorable Prime Minister of the Solomon Islands, on the Choiseul Integrated Climate Change Programme, CHICCHAP. CHICCHAP reflects an innovative approach to bundle resources from Government Agencies and different donors into a holistic, cross-sectoral, multipartner ridge to reef approach to development. This model has attracted considerable interest in the region and beyond, and is already copied by Kiribati in its Whole of Island Approach on Abaiang. SPC and GIZ are proud to be part of the CHICCHAP experience, and we hope that it will be replicated also in other regions of the Solomon Islands, and of Melanesia.

In closing, please allow me to thank you, the leaders of Fiji, Solomon Islands, Papua New Guinea and Vanuatu, your Governments and people for the warm and cordial relations and the for the excellent collaboration. I also want to thank Director General Peter Forau and his team in the MSG secretariat for the excellent collaboration and friendship.

Excellences, we will continue to stand at your side in your efforts to cope with the impacts of climate change.
